Bob Veillette, the former managing editor of the Republican-American, suffered a rare form of stroke earlier this year. The stroke severely damaged the area of the brain stem that links the brain to the rest of the body. For a musician and a communicator this is particularly cruel. Bob can see, hear, feel pain and comprehend all that’s around him, but he cannot move or speak. There is no cure for this condition, called “locked-in syndrome.” Victims often live for decades. The best hope for Bob at this point is that he will be able to develop communications skills beyond blinking his eyes. His physical therapists and family are working with him daily and he has made some limited progress.

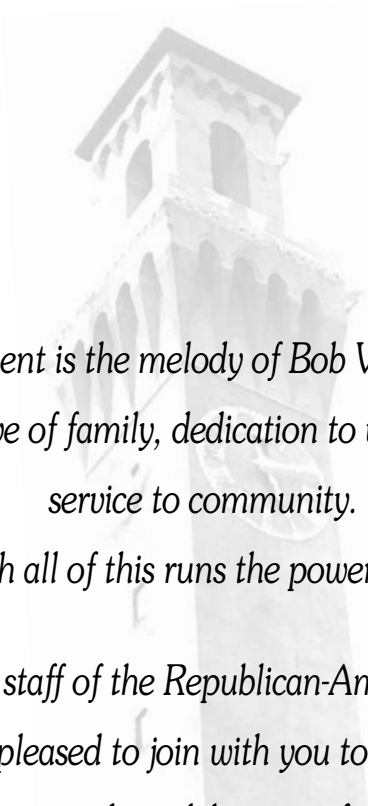
Bob grew up in Naugatuck, playing baseball, swimming and studying the piano. After stints at the old Naugatuck Daily News and the U.S. Army, he joined the reporting staff of the Waterbury Republican, rising quickly to city editor and then managing editor. In more than two decades as the managing editor, he helped oversee the newspaper’s conversion to offset publishing, the merger of the morning Republican and afternoon American and the development of dozens of major news stories, including two that were nominated for Pulitzer Prizes.

When he wasn’t working, the music flowed: benefits for The Red Cross, United Way, libraries in Naugatuck and Waterbury, and Shakesperience, to name just a few. Wherever a melody was needed up and down the Naugatuck Valley, Bob’s jazz improvisations could be heard. He has touched the lives of tens of thousands of newspaper readers and thousands of music lovers.

A Naugatuck native and a graduate of The Juilliard School, Michael Barakat is an award-winning recitalist and singer/actor. 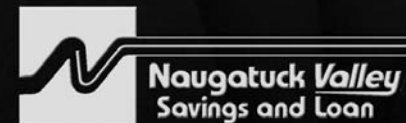
